HEART OF BUCKS HOLDS ITS FIRST EVER ONLINE ANNUAL SUPPORTERS RECEPTION

With the coronavirus pandemic restrictions, it was sadly not possible to hold our Annual Supporters Reception as we normally would. We therefore decided to embrace the opportunity to open up the festivities to a bigger audience this year.

Our first ever Online Annual Supporters Reception took place on Monday 12th October. The event took place on our social media channels and opened with the launch of our Annual Report 2019/2020. The report details our achievements and highlights for the past financial year, complete with impact stories from funding beneficiaries in our six 'impact categories'.

The online event next featured our Online Annual Supporters Reception video, which gave some insight into the new format this year before introducing speeches from our Chairman, the Countess Howe DL, and our CEO, Henry Allmand.

The Countess Howe also took this opportunity to thank our supporters for their continued engagement with us in her final year as Chairman. "The recruitment process for my successor is well under way", she shared, "and I am very pleased to say that I shall not be leaving the organisation entirely when I step down from the Chair... [as] I will have the honour of holding the role of President of Heart of Bucks".

Finally, we announced the winners of our two awards: The People's Choice Award 2020 and the Coronavirus Community award [details on page 2].

ANIMAL ANTIKS & RED KITE RADIO WIN ONLINE SUPPORTERS RECEPTION AWARDS





As part of this year's Online Annual Supporters Reception, we held an online public vote for two awards in the weeks leading up to the event. The People's Choice Award was an award we established last year, encouraging our supporters to vote for a group whose work in the community and impact on the local area makes Bucks a better place to live. The nominees this year were Animal Antiks, Chiltern Rangers, Marlow Museum, Startup and Youth Concern.

We were delighted to end the online event with the announcement that Animal Antiks won The People's Choice Award 2020 and Red Kite Radio won The Coronavirus Community Award. Both winners will be receiving £500 prize funding.

OUR WINTER WARMTH APPEAL LAUNCHES FOR 2020

The Heart of Bucks Winter Warmth campaign is encouraging people who receive the government 'Winter Fuel Payment' and are able to pay their heating bills to donate it to help vulnerable people keep warm this winter. Any donation from anyone, however small, can have a big impact on a struggling person or family this winter.

It has been a difficult year for all of us, but for vulnerable people in Bucks the colder weather is going to pose an even bigger problem than in previous years. With many out of work, working reduced hours or otherwise struggling financially, heating their home is going to be a challenge. For many, it won't even be an option.

Winter Warmth helps vulnerable people across Buckinghamshire who struggle to keep warm in the cold months, including older people, lone parents with children under the age of five and households requiring additional heating because of a household member with a disability. The recipients not only receive a oneoff grant to help them keep warm, but also receive support, resources and guidance for Heart of Bucks'

Community Advocates. In addition to granting money towards heating bills, donated funds are often spent on warm winter clothing and items to keep warm in the home: something as small as a hot water bottle or a kettle.

CHILTERN RANGERS ENGAGE AROUND 1,000 VOLUNTEERS TO HELP THE LOCAL ENVIRONMENT



Project: Coaching volunteers and engaging children of keyworkers to look after local natural habitats
Grant: £3,000
Fund: NET Coronavirus Appeal

Chiltern Rangers is an organisation working in Bucks and the wider Chilterns, providing practical habitat management to enhance the Chiltern's habitats through conservation, education and community engagement.

When the coronavirus pandemic began in the UK and lockdown was enforced, Chiltern Rangers' environmental work was brought to a halt in order to keep their volunteers safe. With the help of their £3,000 grant from the NET Coronavirus Appeal, they have been able to bring back their volunteers step by step to take part in community projects with an environmental focus.

Chiltern Rangers' funding was used to induct, coach and build the confidence of their volunteers. They put measures in place to ensure a set number of volunteers attended each session in order to keep a social distance, enabling them to safely coach over 380 under-18 volunteers and 600 adult volunteers between 19th May and 18th October. In total, the volunteers contributed 2,400 hours of time to improving Buckinghamshire's woodlands, rivers, meadows, parks and community spaces. They have also re-started their Forest Ranger

School Programmes with 200 children enjoying learning outdoors already.

The funding was also used to buy extra tools to ensure the safety of the volunteers, including a mobile handwashing kit, antiviral sprays, and gloves and goggles for volunteers to keep.

In July, Chiltern Rangers were able to support the children of keyworkers, with 18 children from Castlefield School joining Chiltern Rangers on a 'Be a Junior Ranger' session as a reward for being at school during the lockdown. The children worked in their 'bubbles', litter picking in Castlefield Woods (clearing the woods of 30 bags of rubbish) and river kick sampling in waders at Desborugh Recreation Ground.

More recently, Chiltern Rangers have re-launched their 'Green Thursday' morning volunteer sessions with extra rakes being bought from the fund for meadow raking. They have also partnered with Barnados to work with young people involved in their Article 12 Youth Group and Be Safe projects.

Coronavirus Stabilisation Funds

With the easing of the lockdown, and with organisations taking the first steps to return to a "new normal" way of working, we are expanding our coronavirus funding offer to enable not-for-profit organisations, hard hit by the impact of the pandemic, to start to stabilise their financial and operational position and move towards recovery. Grants of up to £10,000 are available.

Green Schools Fund



This fund is open to all primary and secondary schools in the Aylesbury Vale area, awarding grants to support environmental projects initiated by the school's students. Grants are expected to be up to \pounds 1,500, although larger grants may be considered where significant added value or matched funding is demonstrated in the application.

Green Community Fund

This fund is open to voluntary and community groups in the Aylesbury Vale area, awarding grants for projects designed to improve the environment and/or public spaces for the benefit of AVDC residents. Grants are expected to be up to £2,500. Larger grants may be considered where significant added value or matched funding is demonstrated in the application.

Flood Recovery & Awareness Fund

Grants can be used to support capital, revenue and project costs and expenditure must relate to flood damage/prevention or awareness in the form of training or education. Grants of up to £5,000 can be applied for by Bucks voluntary and community groups that are charitable in purpose and town/parish councils.

Grants from this corporate fund are available to voluntary and community groups that are charitable in purpose to support capital and project costs. Grants of up to £5,000 are available to groups working for the benefit of residents living within Aylesbury Vale and helping those most in need in the community.

Youth Bank



Buckinghamshire Youth Bank primarily funds activities and projects that benefit vulnerable young people aged 12-19 years (and up to 25 years for young people with disabilities). The fund aims to give young people a voice within the community and young people from a wide range of backgrounds have an opportunity to be part of this panel, which offers grants of up to £3,000.

KOP HILL CLIMB HOLDS VIRTUAL EVENT



We weren't the only ones moving a yearly event online this year. With COVID-19 restrictions cancelling the 2020 Kop Hill Climb, the team behind the event decided to move the event to social media to raise money for the charities they support.

Part of their 'every pound is precious' campaign, Kop Hill Climb's virtual event took place on Sunday 20th September.

The event involved an arrray of images and videos for car and bike fanatics, from a selection of fantastic images taken at the hill climb throughout the years, to videos of how the team of over 300 volunteers make the event happen, to a hair-raising point of view video so viewers could take the vitual driver's seat!

Some famous faces even made an appearance, with TV mechanic Fuzz Townsend, antique expert Eric Knowles, former rally driver Paddy Hopkirk MBE and presenter and Kop Hill Patron Mike Bushell all making a video appearance.

£73k BUCKINGHAMSHIRE CAPACITY FUND GRANT IS AWARDED

The Buckinghamshire Wellbeing Capacity Fund offered a one-off grant of £73,000 to a charity or community group to deliver a holistic project to support wellbeing across the county and make Buckinghamshire's recovery from the coronavirus pandemic sustainable.

The grant, funded jointly by Heart of Bucks, The Clare Foundation and the Rothschild Foundation, was awarded to The Oasis Partnership, a Bucks charity that provides social and psychological support services to improve health and wellbeing.

The Oasis Partnership will be using this funding to run their 'Listen, Learn and Adapt' project; a collaboration of five Buckinghamshire charities, working with BAME communities, enabling organisations to become more inclusive and diverse and supporting improved community engagement. Heart of Bucks CEO Henry Allmand said, "Heart of Bucks are pleased to have had the opportunity to work collaboratively with our partners to establish this larger funding opportunity for the non-profit sector in Bucks. The calibre of applications was extremely high, and we are grateful for the opportunity to consider such a wide range of excellent potential initiatives. Congratulations to The Oasis Partnership on their successful bid, which aims to transform engagement with BAME communities in Bucks".

We received four excellent applications, all of which brought together a number of partners providing innovative ideas for supporting local people.

We would like to thank our independent panel who gave significant time and expertise to the consideration of these applications.

NEW COMMUNITY INVESTOR FUND MAKES IT EASIER FOR CORPORATE DONORS TO GIVE



We have set up the new 'Community Investor Fund' to make charitable giving for businesses straightforward and simple.

The new fund, set up with five local founding businesses, provides an essential link for the local business community into the non-profit sector.
