Heart of Bucks is the community foundation for the county; a charitable funding organisation that awards grants and loans to local causes, charities and community groups.

Part of UK Community Foundations (UKCF), the national network of community foundations, we are one of 46 foundations in the country and one of the largest non-statutory funders in Buckinghamshire.

We have a unique understanding of the needs of Buckinghamshire and offer the easiest route for local individuals and businesses to give back to the community they love. Through research and outreach work we ensure that funding reaches groups and charities who need it most and can use it effectively.

Heart of Bucks works in partnership with other Buckinghamshire-based charities and organisations to build a better quality of life for all.

Every three years Heart of Bucks undergoes an independent quality accreditation as part of our membership of UKCF. We are also registered with the Fundraising Regulator.

What is a Community Foundation?

A community foundation is a charitable funding organisation dedicated to improving the lives of people in a defined local geographic area.

We bring together the financial resources of individuals, families and businesses to support not-for-profits in the community.

Coronavirus funding

The coronavirus outbreak has had a huge impact on our local community, as indeed it has on a global scale.

The 2019-2020 financial year sits in a very unique and unprecendented space, starting in a very different place to the locked-down world in which it ended.

This Annual Report captures our work in the Buckinghamshire community before the enormous impact of the coronavirus was felt by local charities, organisations, community groups and individuals. We therefore would like to give an overview of our work in 2020 to support the most vulnerable and disadvantaged people in our community, which will be fully reported in next year's Annual Report.

In March 2020, Heart of Bucks launched the Bucks Coronavirus Response Appeal to provide emergency funding to people and charities in Buckinghamshire who were most affected and vulnerable as a result of the outbreak. As a member organisation of UKCF, we were also the local distribution partner in Buckinghamshire for funds allocated to the county from the National Emergencies Trust (NET) Coronavirus Appeal.

In total, Heart of Bucks distributed ...

£396,240

in emergency grants in response to COVID-19.

Heart of Bucks are proud to be part of a strategic funding group together with Buckinghamshire Council, The Clare Foundation, The Rothschild Foundation and Leap, which as of August 2020 had distributed over £1 million in grants to support local volunteering organisations, community groups, charities and individuals.

Continuing with emergency funding but with sights set on the future, we have now set up the Bucks Coronavirus Stabilisation Fund. With the easing of the lockdown, and with organisations taking the first steps to return to a "new normal" way of working, this fund expands our funding offer to enable not-for-profit organisations, hard hit by the impact of the pandemic, to start to stabilise their financial and operational position and move towards recovery.



Finally, I would like to express how much I have enjoyed being part of the organisation and what an honour it has been to Chair it for the past 8 years. Happily I won't be leaving completely as in my new role as Lord Lieutenant of the County I will become President of Heart of Bucks.

During an eventful year for the Foundation, it was a very special moment for me personally when, in September 2019, the Board offered me the opportunity to work with them to grow and develop the organisation over the coming years.

I joined the Foundation at a time of considerable change for Buckinghamshire. This was the last year of a two-tier local government system. As we closed out the year, we said goodbye to our former partner organisations, the district and county councils, and warmly welcomed the new Buckinghamshire Council. Along with so many local people, I share a great sense of optimism about the evolving Buckinghamshire identity. We are experiencing a rare opportunity to further enhance Buckinghamshire's position as a leading economic and civic place in the UK.

Without the interest and involvement of so many of our supporters, we simply would not exist. It is especially important that during times of adversity and challenge that our community rallies together. We have seen so many examples of generosity from our donors and supporters this year that have enabled our work to continue, that I am filled with optimism for the future.





Physical & mental health, wellbeing & safety

Projects completed: 76

Amount awarded: £242,557.68

Thames Valley Air Ambulance

Project: Purchasing a life-saving portable blood

warming machine **Grant:** £3,000

On-the-spot blood transfusions have been proven to significantly improve patient survival, but it's vital that air ambulance crews store blood at the correct temperature to make these life-saving transfusions possible.

This grant enabled Thames Valley Air Ambulance to purchase a new, state-of-the-art piece of

equipment called a 'QinFlow'. Blood and Fresh Frozen Plasma must be stored at 4 degrees centigrade, but before it is administered to a patient it needs to be warmed to body temperature (37 degrees).

The QinFlow is the only portable blood warming machine on the market that is capable of warming fluids from any input temperature to 37 degrees in 11 seconds, enabling immediate transfusion and therefore increasing chances of survival.



Wheelpower

Project: Running 'Feel Inspired' sports camps for disabled children and young

people

Grant: £3,000



WheelPower sports camps give disabled children the chance to experience wheelchair sport in a safe, engaging environment that caters for their individual needs, abilities and interests. With the help of this grant, Wheelpower were able to deliver two two-day sports camps for, supporting 192 disabled children and young people.

Each sports camp offered 10 different sports; table tennis, shooting, basketball, fencing, cricket, tennis, boccia, archery, badminton and zone hockey.

"As my turn came up for wheelchair cricket, I just clammed up — I got so fearful... It was a real challenge for me to get involved, but the coaches were so encouraging and spotted instantly that I was struggling. They gave me the confidence to know that it was the taking part that counts".

Youth Enquiry Service

Project: Contribution to core costs to enable free counselling

Grant: £5,000

Youth Enquiry Service (YES) is a charity based in High Wycombe that offers free and confidential support and counselling to 13-25 year olds.



With around 700 young people using their services in a year, and demand ever-increasing, YES applied for funding to support their core costs in order to keep the drop-in centre open and for training costs to bring in and support more volunteers.

Their counselling service has helped many young people to overcome lower level mental health issues, preventing their problems escalating to the point where they need long-term support. This provides young people with the tools to manage issues surrounding their development, such as low self esteem, anxiety and depression.

Animal Antiks

Project: 'Fun on the Farm' learning sessions during the school holidays

Grant: £4,940

Animal Antiks work with children and young adults who are either out of main-stream education or have learning difficulties to build their skills and confidence. This grant enabled them to run 16 animal-assisted

learning sessions during the school holidays for various local groups and organisations.

The groups supported included Florries, Child Bereavement UK, Aylesbury Vale National Autistic Society, GRASPS autism support group, Puzzle Centre and Quarrendon Friday lunch club. Each session lasted two hours and took place on their 250 acre farm in North Marston with their large animal family of alpacas, horses, ponies, donkeys, goats, pigs, chickens, ducks, sheep and dogs.

Through this project, Animal Antiks supported over 200 people. Their 'Fun on the Farm' sessions included activities such as grooming, feeding,



animal encounters, walking the animals and collecting eggs, as well as craft activities and a wheelbarrow agility course. They also ran 'walk and talk' sessions, predominantly aimed at adults, which included an opportunity to meet the animals and then go for an hour's walk around the farm with some of them.

The arts, culture & heritage

Projects completed: 6

Amount awarded: £17,542

Young People's Puppet Theatre

Project: Teaching students how to make and use puppets in preparation for a full puppet show to

their schoolmates and teachers

Grant: £3,540

Young People's Puppet Theatre (YPPT) promotes puppetry in schools as a means of getting young people engaged in the arts, performance and group work that often doesn't form part of the standard curriculum.

YPPT's projects centre around building confidence, resilience and social skills, often with children who have educational needs or who have other disadvantages, for example difficulty speaking the English language or living in poverty.



With this grant, YPPT were able to deliver puppet-making sessions to Stony Dean School, a special educational needs school in Amersham, which culminated in a final performance of Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. The grant helped fund all the required art materials for the making of the puppets and sets, the provision of specialist equipment including staging and lighting using professional-grade materials, transport for the materials and equipment to the school and script royalties.

The project has made a huge difference – and not only to the 32 pupils involved in the creation of the show. Staff were amazed at the level of concentration and focus of both the performers

and the audience (roughly 120 students) and the performances were incredibly well received.

In addition to the immense confidence boost brought about by the project, students were also given the opportunity to gain either a Bronze or a Silver level Arts Award for their work towards the final show. The Arts Award is a qualification offered by Trinity Guildhall and is a means of certificating the skills gained by the students during the project. Many of the students at Stony Dean struggle to gain academic qualifications due to their disabilities and so this was a fantastic opportunity to recognise and celebrate their achievement.

"From the moment the narrators took to the stage I was overcome with many emotions... the pride I had when the pupils were delivering the language of Shakespeare, the engagement from the audience, many of which have attention deficit and short term memory issues, all of whom listened politely and enjoyed the performance. The professionalism and the professional feel the production had, made me feel like I was sat in the theatre. It blew me away!"

Head2Head Theatre

Project: A production of 'Toad on the Road'

Grant: £875



'Toad on the Road' is a Head2Head Theatre adaptation of Kenneth Grahame's 'The Wind in the Willows', a touring production that takes children with disabilities and their families on a journey of fun and discovery.

With this grant, Head2Head Theatre were able to extend their 36-day tour of the production across schools in London and the South East to include a two-day tour at Booker Park School in Aylesbury, a large primary special school for children with a broad diversity of complex needs.

The days offered the children a relaxed introduction to theatre, with an interactive walkabout performance of Toad on the Road, a visit to the sensory tent and additional games and craft activities, followed by a picnic lunch. In addition to providing a fun an educational activity for the children, the sessions also encouraged interaction between families, in turn helping to extend their support networks.

Marlow Museum Centre Project

Project: Running 'The Story of Marlow' exhibition for the museum's 10th anniversary

Grant: £1,000

This grant enabled Marlow Museum to mark the milestone of their 10th anniversary by repairing and redecorating the museum to make way for a new exhibition called The Story of Marlow. The exhibition aimed to make the museum more appealing to all age groups and to present the history of Marlow in a clearer and more interesting way, to both locals and visitors from around the world.

As part of the project of telling local stories, Marlow Museum created information panels, wall hanging flip displays a video of local people talking about Marlow in the 20th Century, to form part of a video display of Marlow history.



"We invited a team of eight people to work on researching and producing the Story of Marlow exhibition. They came from the key partners we work with, such as the 2 archaeological societies, Marlow Library, the Marlow Society and so on. The library suggested we include a young man who was out of work but volunteering part time at the library.... [he] became really enthusiastic about the project...

He clearly gained confidence and was proud of his achievement, bringing his mother to the launch party to see it. I think the experience helped him. I have since heard that he has been offered a permanent job at the library".

Education & employment

Projects completed: 14 Amount awarded: £52,355

Startup

Project: Providing young women with coaching and workshops in life skills to improve future

prospects and employability

Grant: £1,908

Startup is an organisation who support women whose lives have come into contact with the Criminal Justice System or who are seriously disadvantaged by social, economic and/or family circumstances.

With this grant, Startup ran a programme for young women in Aylesbury Vale and the Wycombe area. This consisted of an initial assessment with a specialist trainer and workshops in areas such as confidence and self-esteem, motivation, goal setting and action planning. The first part of the programme focused on setting personal goals, coaching and training, while the latter part focused on supporting the beneficiaries to reach their longer term aspirations.



Make a Special Kid Smile

Project: Keeping a school dog at Stocklake Park School

Grant: £4,500



This grant enabled students of Stocklake Park School, a special school for secondary ages, to have a furry friend in the form of Patience, the golden labrador, who stays at the school.

The grant contributed to the cost of having an expert dog handler who works full time in the school with the dog and the students. Make a Special Kid Smile have seen many benefits and evidence that this Animal Assisted Education is supporting students' learning, wellbeing and ongoing therapy.

The school dog handler and dog team support students to achieve personal objectives, including understanding safety in the community, personal care, confidence, responsibility, communication skills and social skills through one-to-one and group sessions based in school and the local community.

Volunteer It Yourself

Project: Teaching trade and building skills to unemployed and/or disengaged young people

Grant: £4,650



Volunteer It Yourself (VIY) challenges young people aged 14-24 to learn trade and employability skills through helping to fix local youth and community facilities in need of essential repairs and improvements.

This grant enabled 23 vulnerable and disadvantaged young people who are not in employment, education or training to develop new vocational skills and improve their work-readiness and employability prospects.

The project involved the young participants volunteering to construct and fit out a new build house in Waddesdon over a seven month period. The participants were mentored by a team of local professional tradespeople

and had the chance, if they wished, to work towards achieving an Entry Level 3 City & Guilds skills qualification. Of the 23 young people who participated in the project, 13 remained engaged throughout the entire seven-month project period and gained the City & Guilds qualification.

"VIY has meant I can make up for what I missed out on at school or college. It's also very motivating because you can help others and your community whilst helping yourself".

Action 4 Youth

Project: Running a personal development course for young people aged 16-17

Grant: £5,000

This grant enabled Action 4 Youth to run their 'Inspiration Programme' for 200 children from seven educational establishments across Buckinghamshire – Bucks College Group, Aspire Pupil Referral Unit, Milton Keynes Academy, Aylesbury Vale Academy, Bourne End School, Mandeville School and Bucks UTC.

The programme is designed to broaden the horizons, thinking and experience of the young people involved, making them aware of how our society works and helping them to understand their place in it. The programme runs for one academic year and covers a varied range of activities and educational trips.

Community cohesion

Projects completed: 8

Amount awarded: £39,206

Carers Bucks

Project: Assisting with rental costs to facilitate the running of 'Ownzone' rooms for young carers

Grant: 2 grants from different funds totalling £6,500

Carers Bucks is an independent charity that supports carers of all ages in Buckinghamshire, not only promoting the interest of carers but also working to advance public education regarding carers in the local area.

A carer is defined as someone without payment (other than the relevant benefits and allowances) who provides help to a partner, child, parent, relative, friend or neighbour who could not manage without their support. This could be due to age, physical or mental illness, addiction or disability.



Carers Bucks work closely with young carers, running clubs, group projects and providing 1-1 support for carers aged between 6 and 25. This grant helped to pay the lease for their 'Ownzone' rooms at their head office in Aylesbury: rooms that have been decorated and set up with the needs of young carers in mind.

For Carers Bucks, the 'Ownzone' rooms are crucial to young carers and the staff who support them. The rooms provide a welcoming and safe environment for the charity to hold workshops, activities and private meetings at times to suit the young people they support. They even offer a drink and snack to any young carers who have missed having breakfast.

The 'Ownzone' rooms and the workshops that take place have had very encouraging feedback from the carers who use the space. Young carers have said that they feel better supported, that they are better informed about the condition of the person they are caring for and that they feel less isolated and more confident.

"Ownzone with its comfy bright sofas and snuggling cushions has a way of creating a relaxing environment to promote discussion".

Tingewick Football Club

Project: Covering equipment and coaching costs to grow the club

Grant: £1,525

Tingewick Football Club is a junior/youth football club that offers grassroots football for local children. At the time of applying for grant funding, the club had one under-16s team, which had started as an under-14s team when the club was originally set up. The club wanted to grow in order to reach more children and offer more football opportunities to the wider community.

As a result of this funding, Tingewick FC was able to set up an under-10s and an under-11s team and supply them with full kit. The grant has also been used to purchase equipment such as balls,



cones and goals which are essential for the team's training and matches. In addition to this, the grant has also enabled Tingewick FC to pay for a level 1 coaching qualification for a parent volunteer who is now the registered coach for the team.

"Being able to set up two new football teams has been of huge benefit to the community. It has promoted health and wellbeing for a large number of children whilst at the same time encouraging parents to spend fun, quality time with them".

Youth Concern

Project: Building a social media campaign to raise awareness of local youth homelessness services

and other services offered by Youth Concern

Grant: £5,000



This grant enabled Youth Concern to work with a communications professional to consult with young people to develop a social media strategy that focused on developing the charity's presence online and reaching the right audiences. The process of creating an engaging social media campaign involved encouraging young people to take selfies in support of the campaign, fundraising, designing posters and being part of a virtual youth steering group.

In total 15 young people actively engaged in the project and as a result Youth Concern now reach many more young people through their social media communications. They grew their Facebook following and also set-up an Instragram account following further consultation with young people who claimed this was their favoured platform.



Isolation & disadvantage

Projects completed: 27

Amount awarded: £84,195

Black Park Shed

Project: Preparing an area of wasteland to function as a user-friendly garden for Black Park Shed

Grant: £1,500

Black Park Shed, located in the area of the old sawmill in Black Park in South Bucks, is a non-profit association offering members of the community a space to meet, socialise and engage in practical activities such as woodwork and gardening.

The Shed provides a friendly space for its members, often either unemployed or retired individuals who have not been previously linked with other social groups, to share experiences, knowledge and skills in a safe and enjoyable environment and to make friends for life with others who share interests and a common purpose.

With the help of this grant, Black Park Shed were able to complete the first phase of their new garden development. They began transforming an area of wasteland near their meeting place into a user-friendly by landscaping garden the area and purchasing materials to build raised bed planters, erect trellis fencing and lay down grass turves and pea shingle around planters.



Not only will the garden become a space where people can meet and work together upon its completion, the process of creating the space has, in itself, brought the members of Black Park Shed together. All members took an active part in constructing the garden and, as progress is made, members are seeing the potential of the communal space and looking at ways to make the area a special place for people to sit and relax.

Aylesbury Foodbank

Project: Preparing and equiping Aylesbury Foodbank's new central warehouse to more effectively

distribute food boxes to those in need

Grant: £3,000



Aylesbury Foodbank distributes food boxes to the four distribution centres around the town from its central warehouse, ensuring that people in crisis are able to feed themselves and their families.

The philosophy of the Aylesbury Foodbank is to provide assistance that will help people get through a crisis and onto a longer term and sustainable solution, referring people in need to organisations and funding sources that can help them to resolve their situation.

The demand for emergency food parcels has increased steadily since the foodbank was set up in 2016. With this grant, Aylesbury Foodbank were able to undertake necessary building work to their new, larger premises, buy packing materials and equipment for the warehouse and equip and furnish a rest room for their volunteers and staff.

Towards the end of 2019, Aylesbury Foodbank said that they'd provided 27,342 meals to local people in crisis that year so far. This is a 54.2% increase over the same period last year, which could not have been achieved in their previous, smaller warehouse.

The Princes Centre

Project: Purchasing a specially-equipped minibus to ensure adults with a variety of needs can attend the Centre for care, support and companionship

Grant: £5,000

The Princes Centre provides day care services for adults of all ages with all types of disabilities and conditions. Visitors to the centre receive care and support, mental and physical stimulation and the opportunity to socialise with others.

Initially, Buckinghamshire County Council kindly loaned a minibus to the Centre. This enabled certain visitors to be transported to and from the Centre for support and to partake in other activities that reduce isolation, such as trips and



days out. Many of the visitors to The Princes Centre are unable to use public transport as a result of both physical and mental disabilities, making the minibus a lifeline for them.

This grant has contributed to the overall cost of purchasing a new minibus, so that The Princes Centre now have their own vehicle that they have adapted to the needs of the individuals they support.



The environment & public spaces

Projects completed: 3

Amount awarded: £3,878.99

Some of these projects were funded and began in the year 2018/19. They are featured here because we received details of the impact of the funding at the end of these projects in the year 2019/20.

Chiltern Rangers

Project: Educating young people about environmental issues and increasing their engagement with

local wildlife Grant: £4,774

Chiltern Rangers are a social enterprise who work with communities to provide practical habitat management.

With this grant, Chiltern Rangers ran both engagement and practical sessions for 114 young people who were guided through the process of conceptualising, planning and delivering a public engagement project, increasing their awareness of local and global environmental issues and how young people can make a difference through collective social action.

Some participants even got involved in a full campaign day named 'Community Environment Day' with the aim of increasing knowledge of and engagement with Youth Social and Environmental Action. On the day, young people were able to share the learnings from their sessions and, along with their families, learned more about their local habitats and what action can be taken to look after them.

The participants felt empowered to take newly learned information back to their schools and community groups and spread the message regarding the environmental impact of litter, pollution and single-use plastics. The local woodland and river has benefitted from a thorough clean up and the creation of eco-themed public art has improved the local public space while continuing to spread environmental awareness.

"It didn't look like there was much litter in the river. As I went in it opened my eyes and showed me how much there really is. I'm 100% coming back to make more difference".

Wycombe Heritage and Arts Trust

Project: Creating a sensory garden in a corner of the Wycombe Museum garden

Grant: £5,000



This grant was used to fund a therapeutic gardener to work with Special Educational Needs students aged between 17 and 25 years and their carers to create a sensory garden in a corner of the Wycombe Museum garden. The young people who took part are mainly non-verbal with high levels of need.

The project was an excellent partnership between Macintyre Life Skills students and carers, museum staff, museum volunteers and the therapeutic gardener from Mind Over Matter.

The corner of the garden used for the sensory area had previously attracted drug addicts and anti-social behaviour. However, the space is now a lovely seating area and planted space that is mentioned regularly on the Museum's Facebook page by visitors. The garden is also used weekly as part of the museum's Forest School and Tiny Tots Storytime Trail.

Buckingham Canal Society

Project: Renovating the Right of Way footpath where it has fallen into disrepair

Grant: £2,317

This grant enabled Buckingham Canal society to renovate the Right of Way footpath that will form part of the new towpath/footpath that will run alongside the future canal renovation.

The restoration of the canal aims to improve and increase access to green infrastructure for the communities along its 11 mile length and, by extension, enhance the wellbeing of the public who live locally to the canal.

In addition to improving the Right of Way footpath, making the stretch of canal accessible to people with disabilities, Buckingham Canal Society also purchased timber to form a new bridge over a stream and a wood chipper to dispose of overgrown trees and hedges in an environmentally friendly way to make sure the footpath was kept clear.


